The 1928 Model "J" Harley-Davidson start-up on Page 3 was another highlight of touring Tim Wiggins' fine collection on our Garage Tour.









When the original owners died, the youngest son and his wife moved in, totally remodeling the house to suit their needs. When the son died, his wife lived on there, finally leaving the house to the city as a museum. The city is presently rehabbing the house.

e stopped at the Hinckley Cafe for an excellent lunch on the way back. While eating, a long-time member, Rick Enck, stopped in to catch up on old times and show us his hot rod Model A roadster. THE WIGGINS COLLECTION

The August 28th Garage Tour was a great success, thanks to organizing and planning by Ron Olsen. It began with a visit to Nick Mazzarella's garage for updates on his '31 Slant projects, and a cooling system flush demonstration on Nick's car.

Ron also displayed his '30 "basement" project, revealing all the goods and tools that could be stuffed into two new out-of-sight sub-floor compartments that he built into the back seat floor of his Tudor.

Then our entourage moved on to Tim Wiggins garage for a private look at his collection of rare Model A's and other motoring collectibles.

Perhaps the rarest Model A of all, Tim's 1904 "first series" Model A, started easily with a twist of the crank, then settled down to a lusty twocylinder "chuff-chuff-chuff" for a brisk drive around the block, with lucky Naper A's member Danny Manola aboard as Tim's passenger. What a thrill to see the jaunty little runabout take off in a cloud of driveway dust, purring all the way!

It was all a museum-quality experience...the 1929 Town Car, the 1931 A-400, the 1931 Station Wagon, the 1931 Cabriolet, the 1930 Packard Roadster, and the early 1930 Briggs Town Sedan showing only 27,000 original miles. All very rare!















CHIP OFF THE OLD CHINA BLOCK?

Paul Herbert reports that his Model A shop in Virginia has obtained one of the Chinese Model A blocks forthcoming from Terry Burtz's California operation. Note it has five main bearings and cam bearings, featuring all insert bearings. That shop is cautiously receptive, but concerned about consistently precise specifications, overall quality of machining, and the possible disruption of the supply chain due to US-China relations. Paul took the top pictures and we thanks the Queensland, Australia, Model A Club for this roundup of product features. Their supply chain to China is, of course, much shorter than ours, so they have already received supplies of the engine-building kits in quantity. Terry Burtz is not offering complete long or short blocks.

Jim's Technical Tip

There are several places on a Model A where you are installing something that is attached with multiple screws. For example, here are a few:

Instrument Panel

- **Floor Boards**
- Side Valve Cover
- Oil pan
 Window trim

When installing such parts, start each screw with a few threads. Leave them all pretty loose to start. Then move the piece around, as needed, to finesse each subsequent screw

into the next threaded hole. The last ones are often the hardest to get aligned. I use an awl in the hole where the screw will be going to adjust the piece to get the holes to line up.

Get all of the screws started, and then go around and tighten them all up in several passes. Have the screw head just touching the piece at first, then make them all snug, then make them all fully tightened. Start by tightening screws in the middle and work your way outward to the ends, alternating left then right as you go through each each of your tightening passes.

PLATES



For those of you driving with Antique Expanded Use License Plates, a new bill extends the unlimited use period. The Unlimited usage was formerly from April 1 to October 31. It is now March 1 to November 30, a two month extension. Illinois Governor J.B. Pritzker signed into law HB2548 authorizing all "Antique Explanded Use" vehicles to be driven without limitation for two additional months each year. Expanded-use Antique Vehicles are defined as being more than 25 years old or a bonafide replica. They were previously limited to traveling to and from auto shows, exhibitions, service stations and demonstrations during the colder months (November 1 through March 31) but could be driven without limitation during the warmer months (April 1 through October 31). Now vehicles with "EA" plates can be driven without limitation from March 1 through November 30. The law went into effect on August 20, 2021.
