



1928 Chicago Motor Club Now a Hampton Inn

A n overnight stay at the Hampton Inn in downtown Chicago reveals that this is no ordinary hotel. Its secret is that it's really a terrific destination for a Model A automobile owner. Here's why...

L ike several other fine old historic buildings in Chicago, the 1928 Chicago Motor Club has found its restoration centered upon conversion repurposing for current needs. In this case, it became a hotel.

t's a fun throwback to the time when Henry Ford was churning out Model A's at Dearborn while architects celebrated machine technology with the exuberant, streamlined forms of Art Deco style.

The building, reopened in 2015 as one of the classiest units in the big Hampton Inn hotel chain, may not be the biggest or the most prominent of Chicago's Art Deco towers. But it is surely one of the city's most winningly selfcontradictory buildings. It is a short building that's all about being tall.

A ll Art Deco defining characteristics are compressed into a great 15-story package just west of Michigan Avenue: a trim silhouette with strong vertical lines; stylish geometric decoration; and a superb integration of art and architecture, specially in the lobby where the freshly restored mural map of the continental United States reigns with regal understatement.

The designers pulled off a \$41 million recycling job that transforms this "temple of transportation" into a 143-room hotel that bears little resemblance to

5/12/21 TECH SESSION LUNCH AT ALAN'S HOUSE

We gathered on May 12th to explore the mysteries of Alan Petrik's 7-Tooth Model A steering column, but even more to enjoy a Petrik cookout repast featuring Diane's beans and a dessert of cupcakes topped with little Model A's. We tore into Alan's old steering column and got it mostly apart, then had a bench talk about 7-tooth vs. 2-tooth types, and retired from the field with some take-apart remaining to be done on the steering column.

Later on, Alan worked on the quadrant by soaking it for 24 hours with PB Blaster and then applied some heat, and got it off without much trouble.

It had rust, dirt buildup, and paint layers that had halted our lunch-hour disassembly efforts. He got it



cleaned up, and found a good photo of a 7tooth quadrant showing that the spark rod has stops top and bottom while the throttle rod has a top stop only.

For correct repairs, he must fabricate a top stop on the spark side of the quadrant.

the more common generic boxes that Hampton Inn more commonly builds along the nation's highways.

It's part of a broader Chicago trend that has turned several historic landmarks into hotels. Among them: the Reliance Building (now the Hotel Burnham), the Carbide & Carbon Building (now the Hard Rock Hotel); the Old Dearborn Bank Building (now the Virgin Hotel Chicago); and the Chicago Athletic Association. Earlier, the old Majestic Building, also home to the Bank of America Theatre, was converted into another Hampton Inn.

The historic building's features will delight architecture and auto buffs, as well as those who once ventured into the building for "TripTiks," the narrow flip books in which each page covered a stretch of highway and pointed out gas stations, hotels and the occasional campground.

The Chicago Motor Club pushed for good roads, provided emergency assistance, and excelled at offering route information for the needs of an ever-rising market of people buying cars and traveling in them in 1928.

The original architects, Chicago's Holabird & Root, turned out much grander Art Deco skyscrapers, like the Chicago Board of Trade Building at the foot of LaSalle Street and the great Palmolive Building, a landmark for drivers on Lake Shore Drive. But what the Motor Club may have lacked in height and girth, it made up for in pre-Digital Age interactivity.

Motorists entering its light-filled, barrel-vaulted lobby would line up at counters to get road maps and travel advice. Across the lobby was a grandly scaled mural map by artist John Warner Norton. The map's sleek geometric lines picked up where those of the building left off. Its naturalistic color palette suggested that drivers wouldn't be conquering nature, they would be immersing themselves in it. This artful diagram was an invitation to travel.

There are crowd-pleasing touches to be enjoyed, like a 1928 Ford Model A Ford that sits on a balcony at the lobby's far end. Rich decoration adorns the lobby walls, including ribbons of silvery ornament and nickelleafed plaster eagles that have been beautifully buffed.

The key, though, is that the lobby's color palette has been retuned after years of rehabs played havoc with its visual harmony. With taupecolored walls, and green-and-black terrazzo floors back in place, the soothing hues of the mural map grow organically from the lobby instead of resembling a piece of art stuck on a white wall.

areful restoration of the map not only smooths sections of the piece that had begun to curl like old cheese. It also restores the map to its original width of 33 feet by incorporating a strip on the right edge that had come off and put in storage. This enhances the map's ability to evoke expansive spaces of a vast continent.

the public can now take in all the splendor from a handsomely understated bar that replaces the old Trip-Tik counters.


