DISPLAYING FAVORITE MODELS

ho among us does not have an assortment of little car models lining the shop or den, in addition to one's full-size rolling stock?

Also, some spare parts just lying around unused or unneeded, like an extra headlight rim and lens?



Make a 1/2" thick plywood disk to fit inside the rim from scrap wood and glue green felt on one side. Cut a circular piece of old mirrored glass and glue it to the other side of the plywood.



Polish the rim, clean the lens and the mirror thoroughly, then tuck the whole assembly into the rim. Pin with brads.

ell, here is an easy little project to use up your surplus odds and ends to make a nice display turntable for one of your model cars. All it takes is a rim and lens, a piece of plywood, some felt and glue, and a piece of mirrored glass.

SUMMER, 2023

Cut the plywood first and sand the edges to fit inside the headlight rim snuggly. Use rubber cement to fasten some felt to the plywood, which will protect the bottom side from scratching your furniture. Find a piece of mirror and cut it round to the same size then screed on some construction adhesive evenly on its backside to stick it to the plywood. When the adhesives have set, the whole assembly can be tucked into the rim and lens, then pinned evenly with round-headed brads.





Ken's Pickup Seeing The Light of Day!

In perhaps the most ambitious of the Naper A's "House Calls" projects to date, our hardy team has descended upon Ken Jagodzinski's 1929 Pickup with the objective of pulling it out of its Rip Van Winkle slumber and getting it back on the road. So far, the engine has been pulled, disassembled, and given a mechanic's rebuild, then re-installed. We have cut out the old wiring harness, begun installation of a fresh harness, cleaned up the light switch parts, installed the clutch and brake peddles, checked clutch travel and steering, and filled and adjusted the two-tooth gear box. We poured five quarts of 10w30 oil down the distributor hole, installed the distributor, and timed the engine. With the water pump, water inlet, starter, fan, e-brake lever, and exhaust pipe also installed, she fired right up and Ken was able to take her for a quick spin around the block. Meanwhile, Ken has cleaned and painted the firewall and pulled out the battery box for



So-Easy Lemon Bars

Convenient refrigerated sugar cookies make quick work of homemade lemon bars. Lime or orange anyone? Takes 8 ingredients. Prep Time 15 minutes, Total hour. 35 minutes.

Ingredients:

- 1 roll Pillsbury Create 'n Bake refrigerated sugar cookies 4 eggs, slightly beaten 1 1/2 cups granulated sugar 2 tablespoons all-purpose flour 2 tablespoons butter or margarine, softened 2 tablespoons grated lemon peel (2 medium)
- 1/3 cup fresh lemon juice (2 medium)

1 to 2 tablespoons powdered sugar




Heat oven to 350°F. In an ungreased 13x9-inch pan, break up the cookie dough. With floured fingers, press the dough evenly in the bottom of the pan to form a crust. Bake 15 to 20 minutes or until light golden brown. In a large bowl, beat the eggs with a wire whisk or fork until well blended. Beat in the granulated sugar, flour and butter until well blended. Stir in the lemon peel and lemon juice. Pour this mixture over the warm crust. Then, bake 20 to 30 minutes longer or until the edges are a light golden brown. Cool completely, for about 30 minutes. Sprinkle with the powdered sugar. With a knife dipped in hot water, cut into 6 rows by 6 rows. Enjoy!
